

From the Pastor's Desk: Lent: (...continued)





We talk a lot about Lent being a wilderness journey because it reminds us of, and reflects, Jesus' 40-day period of fasting, praying, and temptation in the desert. And, this year, I've been feeling a lot of "wilderness" surrounding my life. Maybe most people also have, because of the disruptions due to COVID during the past year. It feels like we've been trekking through some very uncharted areas. At times, it feels like exile. We've been thrown into a strange land (not by our own doing) and everything is not as it used to be. We've not been able to worship at the church, we haven't been able to safely visit with family and friends, people have lost jobs, and too many people have died during this dismal pilgrimage.

Yet, in the midst of what seems like a year-long Lent, we're being asked to intentionally walk the lonesome valley again. However, even though we're surrounded by the reminders of sacrifice, chaos, and confusion, I also have been feeling God's hopefulness peeking through – like the way new flowers break the hard, cold earth as spring beckons.

It feels as if God is saying, "Hang in there. New life is on its way." Still, we're not meant to rush through the bleakness of Lent, and we definitely shouldn't skip this portion of our faith walks – even though it seems like we've been "Lenting" for a year.

Given that our faith is a faith of remembrance (and yes... we humans are good at forgetting things), Lent is meant to be a stark reminder. It is a reminder to check our lives for areas that we need to let go of, things we need to pick up, and places where we need God's resurrection power to make things right. During our time in Lent, God works in us to make our faith stronger, bring about new hopes, and give energy to lifeless dreams. And all this takes time. If we rush this process, we could miss God along the way, and we'd miss God blessing our lives. Lent is about time, intentionality, and paying attention.

So now the good news. During this difficult period of our faith walks – when we traverse the wilderness to end up at a cross – we are resuming in-person worship services. Starting Sunday, March 7, we will offer both the 9:00 and 11:00 services (please see the newsletter announcement for more details). It will be wonderful to see each other, even though we'll still be donning our face coverings. We'll be doing things a little differently than we did "pre-COVID," like sitting at least 6 feet apart, not singing in services for a while, and not passing the plate for an offering. But, we will come together as the church family to worship our Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer. And, we will come together to lift each other up and share our love. And what big love there is in our church!

So, during this paradoxical Lent of sorrow and hope, let's not get ahead of God, and let's not rush through this intentional season of self-examination and repentance. But... may we truly appreciate our time together in worship – in our church home. Our exile is almost over. Easter is coming.

In-person Worship Service

We are resuming in person worship services on Sunday, March 7, and will offer both 9:00 and 11:00 services. Children's church will be available during the 11:00 service, and will take place in the Fellowship Hall. We will have restrooms available, as well. In addition, Sunday school classes are invited to meet, but please check with your class leader to make sure you are meeting.

If attending, please adhere to the church's health guidelines by wearing a face covering at all times, getting your temperature checked prior to entering the sanctuary, and sitting in "open" pews only (and please sit 6 feet away from others in your pew).

We will not sing during the worship services, but hopefully we will again soon. And, we will not distribute pew Bibles, hymnals, or bulletins for a while. We will not "officially" collect the offerings through a "passing of the plate," but the offering plates (regular and Children's Change Offering) will be in the narthex. Communion celebrations will be with individually packaged elements.

Polity & Doctrine 101:

Church Hierarchy... or Lack Thereof

Season for **dCOM** BOM. What? You are not familiar with these words? Well, allow us to explain. dCOM stands for District Committee on Ordained Ministry. BOM is the acronym for Board of Ordained Ministry. dCOM aids the local church in the process of identifying persons for ordained ministry as deacon or elder or for service as a licensed local pastor or certified lay minister. Once approved by dCOM, candidates meet with the BOM who are responsible for credentialing candidates and clergy, as well as recommending them for licensing (local pastors and lay ministers) and ordination (deacons and elders). The entire process from dCOM to BOM to ordination takes a minimum of 4 years. Whew!

Since 2013, we have helped families and individuals with \$179,813.38 through community assistance.
