Methodism 101: Spiritual Formation – Grace (Part 3)

As we discussed in the last two issues of the newsletter, Methodism breaks down grace into three separate, but equally powerful, forms. The first is *prevenient* grace – God's active presence in our lives before we ever sense the Divine at work in our lives. Next is *justifying* grace – where we align ourselves with God, accepting God and the gracious gift of new life freely given to us. Third is *sanctifying* grace. This is the grace that moves beyond forgiveness and acceptance of our identity as beloved children of God. Sanctification is the lifelong process by which Christ followers are made holy and whole.

To take this a little deeper, Wesley affirmed that God's grace seeks nothing less than a new creation in the likeness of Jesus Christ, and that sanctification moves us towards "holiness of heart and life." In fact, in one of his sermons, he noted, "Christian perfection does not imply Christians are exempt from ignorance, making mistakes, infirmities or being tempted." Instead, he affirmed perfection as another term for holiness (or maturity).

Sanctification, then, is the continuing process of being made perfect (holy and mature) in love. So, if we go back to the house analogy, if prevenient grace is the porch of the house and justifying grace is the doorway, sanctifying grace represents all the rooms in the expansive dwelling of God's presence. They are never-ending, as we spend a lifetime seeking God's higher better ways for our lives so that we can help write better stories in people's lives.

Did You Know?

- The first Christians were Jewish folks who came to believe Jesus was the Messiah (deliverer). Their evangelism (telling the good news) to others is the reason everyone can know Jesus as our Messiah.
- In the United States, as noted in a 2019 Pew estimate, 65% of adults identify as Christians. In the entire world, 31.2% identify themselves as Christian.
- Wesley believed you could not be a Christ follower on your own. Meaning, we only grow in our faith within community. Additionally, he noted that we need to be involved in social holiness, stating, "The gospel of Christ knows no religion but social; no holiness but social holiness." This means we are to put our faith into action within our worshipping family and outside the walls of our church – within the community.
