From the Pastor's Desk: We're Easter People





I often say that we're Easter people and we live with the hope and promise of the resurrection. But what does it really mean to be Easter people? How do we live into the hope and promise of resurrection? For starters, resurrection isn't just about our physical bodies brought back to life after we experience death. This is the promise of eternal life Jesus offers us and it will be a glorious experience to have our physical bodies - but with no infirmaries, ailments, and the effects of gravity. And John notes in his Gospel account that Jesus told his disciples that he was going to prepare a place for them and that he would come back for us and bring us to the place he's prepared. Again, what a glorious thought that is! But Jesus also said that he leaves us peace while we're in this world - peace that the world doesn't give nor can take away. And I believe part of being Easter people is accepting the gift of Jesus' peace and sharing it abundantly with others. It is a peace that surpasses our understanding, and it guards our hearts and minds.

Matthew notes Jesus teaching us that blessed are the peacemakers. And peacemaking oftentimes is challenging because it stirs up the status quo and threatens systems of power and oppression. And that usually means it threatens to take away people's profits. As Easter people, who believe in the hope and promise of resurrection, we are called to be peacemakers – to call out all that denies dignity, equity, justice, and safety. In essence, we are called to "kill" that which does not bring about life so that God can bring about new life in its place.

Resurrection is change, transformation, and new life. And this can (and does) happen to us in this life... daily if we allow God to change our hearts and lives. When we let go of a bad habit, something that consumes us, something that limits us, or something that constrains us and others, we allow God to do the work of resurrection. And as we've recently noted, before resurrection can occur, death needs to happen. But... death does not have the final word in God's Story (or ours). The worst thing is the not the final thing. It's not the end of the story. And being Easter people means that we face change and transformation as natural and needed parts of life. Sure, change can be scary. But God us our shepherd who leads us through the valley of the shadow of death into green pastures and still waters. Yet another glorious thought!

So, what changed, transformed, new life does God want to bring about in your individual life? In our collective church life? And in our community and world? What do we need to let go of? What do we need to pick up? Who do we need to listen to? Who's needs are going unmet? What assets do we have that we can share with our neighbors? What gifts and talents do we have that will change people's hearts and lives? What legacy will we leave – indifference or passion and purpose?

Being Easter people is challenging. But anything worthwhile is worth the struggle. Jesus never promised that if we believe in him that we'd live pain -free, trouble-free, or have everything we want. In fact, Jesus never asks us to believe in him. Jesus asks us to follow him. And following Jesus means we, like Jesus, die to self for the sake of a better world. We die for the sake of resurrection. And not just our resurrection, but so that others can experience resurrection, too.

We're Easter people. Resurrection is real. It changes the story. It changes us. May our lives reveal the truth of God's resurrection power for everyone. May we follow Jesus, not just believe in him.

Methodism 101: Aldersgate

The term "Aldersgate" may sound familiar if you have attended Methodist services on a regular basis, but the significance of the word may be elusive, even to the most seasoned of Methodists. So here it is, in black and white.

Aldersgate Day is celebrated on May 24, or the Sunday closest, to commemorate the day John Wesley, the founder of Methodism, felt his heart "strangely warmed." Put another way: his intellectual understanding of faith transformed into a more personal experience. This conversion happened in a building on Aldersgate Street in London, England, as he was listening to a Moravian preacher reading Luther's *Preface of the Romans.*

Wesley wrote in his journal that at about 8:45 p.m. on May 24, 1738 "while he was describing the change which God works in the heart through faith in Christ, I felt my heart strangely warmed. I felt I did trust in Christ, Christ alone for salvation; and an assurance was given me that He had taken away my sins, even mine, and saved me from the law of sin and death." That day, Wesley experienced a newly minted confidence in his own salvation.

So, Aldersgate Street was shortened to simply Aldersgate. And the rest, as they say, is history.

Did You Know?

- Keeping with the Aldersgate theme:
- Shirley Murray's hymn "How Small a Spark Has Lit a Living Fire!" celebrates Wesley's Aldersgate experience and was written in 1988 for the 250th anniversary of the event.
- Daniel L. Burnett called the conversion experience Wesley's "Evangelical Conversion," even though he was already a priest.
- The actual street number of the building was 200 Aldersgate Street.
