Christmas Presence





I didn't grow up going to church. We didn't attend worship services on the "big three" days — Christmas, Easter, and Mother's Day. My family wasn't religious, but I knew about God. We kids prayed before our nightly meals, and when I was very young, I would say prayers before going to sleep. As a child, that was the extent of my understanding of God. So, when Christmas rolled around each year, I was giddy with excitement because I looked forward to the Christmas presents. The ones Santa would bring, the ones my parents and siblings gave me, those from grandparents, aunts and uncles, and even some friends. When I was a youngster, Christmas was all about the presents.

And I still enjoy presents, though, nowadays I enjoy giving the gifts more than receiving them. I also understand that giving gifts to those we love is a beautiful and prophetic part of our Christmas traditions. We express our love towards those we give our gifts, and we remind them (and ourselves) about the gift God gave to us - God's presence among us. And this is the real reason for the season - Christmas presence. I often refer to the first chapter of the Gospel of John, as told by Eugene Peterson's "The Message" translation. There it says, "...the Word became flesh and blood and moved into the neighborhood. We saw the glory with our owns eyes, the one-of-a-kind glory, like Father, like Son, generous inside and out, true from start to finish" (John 1.14 The Message). God planned all along to pay us a visit through the person of Jesus. And Jesus taught and showed us that a meaningful life is all about showing up - being present for and with others. 

Along with focusing on the coming of Christ during this Advent season (the four weeks prior to Christmas), we're also looking at ourselves – at who we really are – through our "From Consumer to Disciple" series. This time of year can bring added stresses because of the consumer culture we live in. It constantly tells us to buy and consume – both for others and ourselves. But God desires that we don't fall into patterns to where we feel the need for everything and everyone to cater to our every wish. We're not created to fill ourselves to overflowing, and then continue to keep filling ourselves. This is an endless and fruitless cycle that separates us from God and each other and moves us far away from the image after which we were created

When we light the Advent candles each week, those of hope, peace, joy, and love, we are reminded of Christmas presence. God showed up (and still shows up) to show us His better ways... the Kingdom of God ways. And these ways tend to rub against the grain of a consumer culture. God asks that we empty ourselves so that He can fill us. Jesus teaches us that if we want to be great, we need to serve others. If we want to save our lives, we need to lose them. God's story reveals God's character of closeness with us. And during Advent, we are reminded of God's presence among us. And we are challenged to be present with others. So, who do you need to be present with this Advent and Christmas? Who do you need to allow to be present with you? What can you let go of (or say "no" to) so that you can offer your presence in a miracle-offering, life changing way? Could you take a meal to (and eat with) someone? Could you offer a few moments to read with and mentor a Lamplighter child? Could you sacrifice some time to give warmth to those who will visit the Beacon Center this winter? What else? Who needs you?

The best gift God gave us is His presence. And the best gift we can give others is... you guessed it... presence. When we get involved in and invested in other's lives, people will be changed and transformed. The Christmas story shows us the depth of love and commitment to presence. And look at how many lives have been transformed because of God's presence! Let's be intentional this Advent and Christmas to spend less... but give more. More of ourselves. More time. More love. More forgiveness. More patience. More presence.

Methodism 101: Doxology

Merriam-Webster defines the word "doxology" as an expression of praise to God, usually liturgical. It is



a combination of the Greek words *doxa*, meaning glory, splendor or grandeur, and *logos* which means "word" or "speaking." The word, doxology, itself dates back to the 4th century and is best known today as the term used for the last paragraph of the Lord's Supper.

Doxologies are an expression of praise to God. In the Christian church, we often hear them sung or chanted as they are a tradition that has meaning and importance for all Christ-followers. Since the early church, doxologies have been a way for Christians to express their love and thankfulness for what God has done in their lives. One of the most common one is found in our United Methodist Hymnals: "Praise God from Whom All Blessings Flow."

As we speak glory and praise to God each day (hopefully, each day) it is a way for each of us to know more about our awesome Creator. As disciples, we are called upon to worship in a way that brings glory to God, and the use of a doxology is a beautiful way to say to God and others that you know where your daily blessings come from. Additionally, it is a powerful way to show that you love a God that has it all under control and will never leave your side. Praise be to God!
